Reflection for Servant Leaders

Moses: Leading with Persistence

Pharaoh said, "Who is the Lord, that I should obey him and let Israel go? I do not know the Lord and I will not let Israel go." (Exodus 5:2). Moses is only three minutes into his leadership journey when he faces opposition. As if this was not enough, even the people Moses was trying to help refused to listen to him. Servant leaders must learn from Moses' example on how to lead with persistence.

Leading with persistence requires help. It doesn't take long after Moses' first encounter with Pharaoh before he returned to the Lord and said, *Oh Lord*, why have you brought trouble upon this people? Is this why you sent me? (Exodus 5:22) Moses knows he needs help to keep going and turns to the source of his call and vision, God himself. Like Moses, servant leaders deliberately seek God's counsel and share their questions appropriately with mentors and colleagues.

Leading with persistence demands a long term view. To make it through these difficult days of the plagues Moses had to keep focused on the future.

God reminded Moses repeatedly of His promise to bring the people out of Egypt. This vision of the future enabled Moses to persevere through the many obstacles. Servant leaders find strength in reminding themselves what God wants to do in the future.

Leading with persistence produces victory. Through all the ten plagues, Moses just kept moving forward. It took time and many major events before Pharaoh's heart was changed with the death of his son but finally, after seven

chapters of struggle, God's people are set free from Egypt. What if Moses would have given up in despair when the seventh plague didn't bring the change for which he hoped? He understood that some leadership challenges take a long time to win and require leaders who refuse to give up. Servant leaders are able to keep leading until the victory is accomplished.

If you're facing a leadership challenge and have felt like giving up, learn from the leadership of Moses that good things happen to leaders who do not quit.
